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
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

 establishing OSHA and providing
 federal workplace safety and
 health protections.

OSHA's Continuing Mission

- OSHA and its state partners, coupled with efforts of employers, safety & health professionals, unions and advocates, have helped dramatically reduce workplace injuries and illnesses.
- Worker fatalities in America are down on average, from 38 workers a day in 1970 to 14 a day in 2017.
- Worker injuries and illnesses are down from 10.9 incidents per 100 workers in 1972 to 2.8 per 100 in 2017.




Today's workplace?

- Occupational fatalities in 2018 were about 5,250 workers
 - Slip, trip and fall / 791
 - Struck by object / 786
 - Electrical contact / 174
 - Transportation accidents / 2,080
 - Death by Suicide / 304

Protecting workers from risk of exposure to COVID-19

- OSHA is coordinating closely with CDC, including NIOSH, and other federal agencies to monitor the ongoing pandemic.
- OSHA's message is clear:
 - Employers should have a plan for protecting workers and preventing further spread of disease, as well as maintaining the employer's day-to-day functions.





Occupational Exposure Risks

- Risk of exposure in many workplaces likely reflects the risk to the general public in the community where the workplace is located
- Risk increases when workers have frequent, close contact with the general public or other coworkers



OSHA Guidance

- OSHA developed a variety of guidance materials for workers and employers on how to stay healthy during the pandemic
- OSHA.gov/coronavirus includes information on implementing the hierarchy of controls when workers have specific exposure risks





Issues Guidance Alerting Employers to Frequently Cited Standards Related to COVID-19 Inspections 11/6/20

The one-pager and guidance document provide available resources that address the most frequently cited standards, including Respiratory Protection, Recording and Reporting Occupational Injuries and Illnesses, Personal Protective Equipment and the General Duty Clause. The one-pager provides examples of requirements employers must follow, such as:

- Provide a medical evaluation before a worker is fit-tested or uses a respirator.
- Establish, implement, and update a written respiratory protection program with required worksitespecific procedures.
- Train workers to safely use respirators and/or other PPE in the workplace, and retrain workers about changes in the workplace that might make previous training obsolete.
- Store respirators and other PPE properly in a way to protect them from damage, contamination, and, where applicable, deformation of the facepiece and exhalation valve.
- Keep required records of work-related fatalities, injuries, and illness.



OSHA Guidance Cont.

For all workers, regardless of specific exposure risks:

- Practice good and frequent hand hygiene
- Follow good cough/sneeze etiquette
- Avoid touching the eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick

OSHA Announces \$2,496,768 In Coronavirus Violations

November 6, 2020

WASHINGTON, DC – Since the start of the coronavirus pandemic through Oct. 29, 2020, the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has issued citations arising from 179 inspections for violations relating to coronavirus, resulting in proposed penalties totaling \$2,496,768.

OSHA inspections have resulted in the agency citing employers for violations, including failures to:

- Implement a <u>written respiratory protection program</u>;
- Provide a medical evaluation, respirator fit test, training on the proper use of a respirator and personal protective equipment;
- Report an injury, illness or fatality;
- Record an injury or illness on OSHA <u>recordkeeping forms</u>; and
- Comply with the General Duty Clause of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970



OSHA Announces \$1,603,544 In Coronavirus Violations

WASHINGTON, DC – Since the start of the coronavirus pandemic through Oct. 15, 2020, the U.S. Department of Labor's Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has cited 112 establishments for violations relating to coronavirus, resulting in proposed penalties totaling \$1,603,544.

OSHA inspections have resulted in the agency citing employers for violations, including failures to:

- Implement a <u>written respiratory protection program</u>;
- Provide a medical evaluation, respirator fit test, training on the proper use of a respirator and personal protective equipment;
- Report an injury, illness or fatality;
- Record an injury or illness on OSHA <u>recordkeeping forms</u>; and
- Comply with the <u>General Duty Clause</u> of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970

Opioids in the Workplace

- Workers in occupations at higher risk for injury and illness –
 such as construction -- are more likely to:
 - Obtain opioid prescriptions.
 - Die from an opioid overdose
- Construction industry has one of the highest injury rates.
- Opioids are commonly prescribed to construction workers.






Region I FY20 Inspection Type






Region I - % Construction Inspections FY19 v. FY20






Region I - Average Number Violation Per Inspection FY19 vs FY20

- OSHA's goal is to increase the number of corrected trenching hazards through enforcement and consultation.









Voluntary Protection Programs


Participants:

- Injury and illness rates are 50% or lower than industry averages



Employees Removed from Hazards FY19/FY20 – Region I






